Rock Island Trail Communities

wensville is centrally located among four other trail communities — all within 10 miles or less of their neighbor. Should the Missouri Department of Natural Resources accept the gift of the former Rock Island line from Ameren Electric this August, residents and visitors from Gerald, Rosebud, Owensville, Bland and Belle could take a two or threeday trip to each community on the hiking and biking path. And these communities have a lot to offer.

From Gerald visit the only Rock Island Depot to survive in all five towns. The little park is perfect for a picnic lunch, and the various restaurants can pack lunches to go. Local Bistro at the Mill owner Cary Parker said he could talk about Gerald's tourism possibilities all day.

"We have the beautiful local parks, and pretty fantastic sports fields," Parker began. "Even if it's not people visiting from hundreds of miles away, I think the parks in Gerald should reflect really well to the surrounding communities."

The city's newest eatery, Figo's Mexican Restaurant, along with the Bistro, are conveniently located near the trail.

"We also have a couple of repurposing and resale shops," Parker said, mentioning Tina's Treasures, and a privately owned bookshop that is coming soon.

Gerald is one of three places in Missouri with a privately funded library offering

a collection of around 10,000 books. A second four-room facility sells used books.

"We have the Gerald Historical Society that is in the process of repurposing the 1910 schoolhouse," Parker added, as an additional site to see along with the Rock Island Depot. "We will be able to start offing historic sites, visitations. With the Rock Island Trail, it will go right through Gerald and runs in front of Highway 50 with a commuter parking lot right next door."

The town also has plenty of commercial space, a grocery store and gas station all easily accessible for trail individuals.

"Then there is the Gerald Cafe on Main Street," Parker added. "I believe Gerald is positioning themselves very nicely to benefit from the visitors."

Parker added that Gerald currently provides similar services to Lost Valley Lake Resort visitors and vacationers, believes businesses would welcome additional newcomers with open arms.

Travel four miles west on Highway 50 to visit Rosebud, home of antique shops, boutiques and pubs. Rosebud Mayor Shannon Grus said her community is already tourism driven, but the trail is the key to their future.

"As a former railroad town, Rosebud reinvented itself as a tourist destination," Grussaid. "We have great shopping, dining options and community events."

Many Rosebud businesses are sand-

wiched between the Rock Island Trail and Highway 50. Visitors shouldn't be afraid to leave the beaten path to visit the little shops along the way.

"Rosebud continues to grow as a tourist destination and this growth is partially spurred on by the many opportunities a finished trail will present," Grus said.

While the town has not fully vetted a trailhead access point within its city limits, many businesses butting with the trail are working towards it, and there are many public street crossings where trail users may access the town from the trail.

"Embracing our economic reality, we know the completion of the trail will allow greater economic opportunities for Rosebud while providing stability for the future," Grus said.

Another seven mile trek west to Owensville, the trail runs past a future "safe way to school," various industries and neighborhoods before leading out to Sears Avenue behind City Hall, and just a block away from First Street businesses.

On the way to First Street, visit the Gasconade County Historical Society's Museum located in the Old Owensville Hotel.

Businesses on First Street include small clothing boutiques, pub and grills, three antique shops and a coffee shop/eatery.

Owensville is also home to several res-

taurants: Dos Primos (Mexican Restaurant), Snowensville and Sweet Caroline's, and Thunder Alley a combination bowling alley/restaurant.

Several buildings are also in various stages of remodeling in preparation for commercial and bed and breakfast space.

Nearly eight miles away, newly elected Bland Mayor Lee Medlock talks about the potential of his town, a gateway between two huge trail communities with the possibility to be more.

"The thing about it is the route between Belle and Bland is five miles," Medlock began. "It's perfect for the amateur biker. It would be a nice trail for someone that is not into the hardcore biking. The stretch/ distance between Bland, Belle, and Owensville, mileage wise is perfect for biking."

The town will soon add a new restaurant, Mama Bear's. The existing diner option is Rustic Garden, open on weekends. Both restaurants are located within sight of the trail, along with Highway 28 Groceries, also open on Fridays and Saturdays and directly located on the trail. KT's Last Call Bar and Grill owner is famous for his barbeque. Down the road, Killing Time Pub offers food and refreshment.

A new resale furniture store recently

opened its doors on Colorado Avenue, with an annex location across from Highway 50 and Jan's Frame Shop is located in the heart of downtown. Yet, Medlock asks trail users looking for potential business opportunities to keep their minds open and Bland in mind for a trail business.

"We have a lot of vacant buildings on main street if anyone would be interested in taking advantage of putting in a business," Medlock said. "We are right on the trail and there are several old buildings nearby and on the main street that could be purchased pretty reasonably too. There is one on the corner that has been redone and left open for whoever or whatever business would want to take advantage of the opportunity."

Medlock says what that town doesn't have in funds, they have in helping hands.

"I think if they give us the OK for the trail, the city doesn't have a lot of money right now, but we have equipment to get the trail lined out," Medlock said.

Medlock asks trail visitors to keep an eye on the City of Bland Mo Facebook page for community events and make sure to stop in on the way to Belle to visit the Gascondy River Bridge or on their way to Owensville to visit the Highway 28 train trestle bridge.

Just five miles further west of Bland on

Highway 28, the city of Belle boasts being ahead of the game with their eye towards trail opportunities.

This self-identified trail community has had a sign on Highway 28 boasting its support of the trail for well over a year. City Court Clerk Barb Schaller has been working to acquire grants for local improvements.

"We have been successful with Coover grant, tree grants at the park, and would like to hit that the Belle community promotes itself through its nearness to the Gascondy Bridge going over the Gasconade River, which will be the highlight of traveling the Rock Island Trail," Schaller said.

The town has also been working towards renovating a former MFA building that faces the trail on Alvarado Avenue to become a trailhead.

"Our goal is to renovate the old MFA building," Schaller said. "I would love to make it a Belle history center."

The MFA location is far from the only public access point.

"People would also be able to access the Rock Island trail from First Street and downtown on Alvarado Avenue near a commuter parking lot," Schaller said. "Or Belle City Park."

\$250,000 grant to install a new sidewalk down Johnson Avenue, which crosses the trail, and will be considered a "safe route to school" as well as the city park. Local officials have also concentrated on park beautification, because the trail travels behind the lake at Belle City Park.

Schaller said travelers coming through on bicycles in need of air for their tires may visit Owen's Towing and Repair and Casey General Store, both located a short distance away and within sight.

She adds that visitors coming into town in either direction, and are minus a picnic basket, should take advantage of the town's food selection.

"If you need a bite to eat, we just put in a Mexican restaurant," Schaller said. "Then there's the Dinner Belle, Greek Restaurant and J&J Cafe."

Porky's, a small barbeque shop where visitors are welcome to eat al fresco, re-

cently opened along Highway 28 as well. After dinner, those looking for a treat are in luck.

"In the mood for an ice cream?" Schaller asked. "Travel from the trail up main street (Alvarado Avenue) and go to Tasty Treat and Bob's Custard."

So those enjoying a camping trip, hiking, biking, or just traveling through, stop in and visit a while. These Rock Island Trail Communities are waiting.

Gasconade County Historical Society Museum

The Gasconade County Historical Museum (GCHS) was constructed about 1910 to serve railroad clientele and has been known as the Owensville Hotel, Ozark Hotel, and the Railroad Hotel.

The museum's focus is primarily on items related to Gasconade County and its residents. The display rooms tell the stories of people coming to this area to start a new life. They depict their homes and farms, clothing and tools, churches and schools. It tells of a people who were involved in six wars, founded businesses, civic and social organizations and left us with a wonderful heritage of music, art and literature.



or over 70 years, the annual Gasconade County Fair has provided plenty of entertainment to unofficially wind down the summer months in Gasconade County and the surrounding area.

Held at Memorial Park (off Highway 28) in Owensville every year since 1947, the fair has numerous activities for children and adults of all ages.

Kids activities have included a nickel scramble, kiddie tractor pull, carnival rides, livestock and animal shows, a parade to collect candy and other items given out along with a Little Mr.



Friday, July 26, 2019 8:30 p.m. on the main stage

and Miss Gasconade County and Gasconade County Fair Oueen contests.

Exotic animal shows and game shows for kids have also appeared at the fair over the vears.

Activities primarily geared for adults have included bull riding, a mud bog, a demolition derby, truck and tractor pulls, motocross, a barbecue cook off and live music by local and national artists.

The headline entertainer

very third weekend in July, in the small town of Rosebud, enthusiasts of old-time farming gather at the Rosebud Community Park for the annual Gasconade County Threshers Association's Steam Engine and Threshing Show.

Formed in August of 1962, the Gasconade County Threshers started their annual show as a part of the Gasconade County Fair.

Moved to Rosebud Community Park in July of 1966, the Gasconade County Threshers Association's annual show has only grown.

In recent years, the number of tractors, steam engines and old gasoline engines has pushed 200.

The show's main objective is to demonstrate to the younger generation how old steam tractor engines were used to supply power for plowing, threshing, sawing, grinding and other farm-related tasks.

Recently, popular activities during the show have included a draft horse pull, parade of tractors and steam engines, tractor pulls, a watermelon eating contest, a cast-iron skillet throwing contest for women, a fiddle and banjo contest, a hay bale toss, car show and pedal-tractor pulls for kids and adults.

Where there are activities, great food isn't far away. Popular food options include pulled beef, hamburgers, brats, hot dogs, fish sandwiches, fries and nachos. Beverage choices include beer, soda,

lemonade, tea and coffee.

Traditionally, fried chicken dinners are also served the third and final day of the show.

For the one-time admission price of \$10, anyone 13 and older can enjoy all three days of the show. Children 12 and under are admitted free with an adult.

Planning is underway for the 57th Owensville Threshers Association show to be held in Rosebud July 19 through the 21.

Douglas Prairie Quilt Trail

Tourism Committee works on "Trail" with quilt block theme.

ne of the best parts about visiting a new area is learning about the local history, what makes the community come together and why it is proud of its origins. The Owensville Chamber of Commerce (COC) Tourism Committee is working on ways to share the pride of the Owensville, Drake and Rosebud communities as "Find Your Own Trail" destinations to encourage tourists to visit area attractions. The group hopes to establish the idea with one of the town's existing allures, a Quilt Block Trail.

Quilt blocks are designed to tell stories, including history, politics and religion. Originally, the chamber hoped to encourage interest and curiosity about Owensville's origins locally. The idea became reality in 2012, when the chamber chose the quilt block "Crossroads" (pictured center) to represent their location on Old Springfield Road because it's building is located at the crossroads of the Old Iron Road and Springfield Road that took travelers between Hermann and Springfield.

Historically, people used to stop and water their mules at the location because it was the halfway point from St. James to Hermann.

When the quilt blocks first began to appear on the exterior walls of downtown businesses, residents and visitors took notice.

"We started out using traditional blocks, but then the Garden Club wanted a large picture of an

applique rose they found in a guilt book, "said Gerri Kellmann, head of the auilt block committee. The blocks grew in popularity "They go as far as the six miles south on Highway EE, as far north as Drake, as far west of Owensville as Lane **Building Products** and as far east as Rosebud." Kellmann said. Now that the Rock Island Trail is going through, more people want to be included. The tourism committee has also added other trails to their web site Contact the chamber with including an antique trail, a wine




