

The evolution of a '67 Chevy truck

Some projects are always a work-inprogress--even when they haven't been touched in a while. For Randy Schweer of Owensville, that project is a 1967 Chevy, four-wheel drive, red pick-up truck.

"I have not done anything with this truck since I joined the fire department in 2008," Schweer said.

The red three-quarter ton Chevy sits beautifully idle in the corner of Schweer's garage-it's red 383 Stroker engine quiet. It is a completely different truck than what he originally purchased.

"I paid \$1,600 for it in 1986," Schweer said.

Two years later, it really became a project. Schweer and his former brother-in-law Danny Aytes thought to switch the 1967 two-wheel drive frame with a 1977 chassis.

"If it wasn't for Danny, it would never have been done," Schweer said. "I worked on a Saturday and he had the body completely off a two-wheel drive truck, and put it on a four-wheel drive chassis."

That wasn't the only modification. He had a friend paint the truck white and started going to mud runs.

For seven years, Schweer ran his truck at events. Then in 1995-96, he decided he was ready for a change. He had his friend Dean Gabathuler of Hermann paint the truck red.

"He painted it red the first time," Schweer

Another friend, George Scott of Union, worked with Schweer at Chrysler and helped him with wiring and brakes.

"I moved my gas tank from out behind the seat to under the bed like a Blazer," he said. "I bought the tank out at Miller's Salvage and we mounted it to the frame."

He also replaced the bed, bedsides, fenders and front fender wells.

By the time he was finished, Schweer realized the truck came out so nice, he didn't want to mud it anymore—he wanted to show it.

have to make things nicer and fix it," Schweer said. "I started showing, but spent a lot of money redoing repainting and replacing."

"I used to go all over the mid-west; Indianapolis, Iowa, Nebraska," Schweer said. "Pretty well-known, this truck is."

One event he attended in Indianapolis, Ind. had 5,000 trucks there that he says would have blown his out of the water.

"Because of the year and model of my truck, a lot of people like it; 67-72 are real popular," Schweer said. "I have over 20 awards I got from these Jamborees I went to."

Schweer's awards line his living room wall and a corner of his garage.

During a rough patch, when the 1967 truck was all he had, Schweer went to Oklahoma and picked up parts at a junk yard to replace what was rusting.

"Oklahoma doesn't have as much of a rust problem," he noted.

A friend in Hermann that owns Out of Town Auto Body repainted the truck red.





engine mounts," Schweer said.

From his time mud running, Schweer said he swears by cleaning parts such as California Customs, aluminum wheel spray and wax, and some MeGuiars cleaning products.

"Best way to do it is let it dry a day or two and take a rubber hammer and just start tapping," he said. "Things will fall right off, but you don't want to get too carried away."

After he finished the last project, Schweer said he parked the truck. "The last time I drove it was to one of the tail-greating football games when they wanted

you to bring your old cars," Schweer said. "I took my granddaughter."

He noticed on that outing that the ol' truck may need a new bushing, which he plans on fixing. However, he says the passion he felt when he first started mud running and showing the truck are gone.

"I don't have it anymore," Schweer said. "I still enjoy going and doing stuff with it, but I am 63 years-old now and I am not working or have the money I used to."

But he remembers the addiction of getting started.

"When I got started, I just liked off-roading, driving, playing in the mud," Schweer said. "Boys will always have toys, they just sometimes get bigger."

Schweer plans on keeping the truck for his two grandkids, and hopes they will get the same kind of thrill he out of it.

"I never named it," he said. "My new passion is music."

Prevent breakdowns with battery care

Many drivers have experienced the misfortune of getting into their vehicles only to realize their engines won't turn over. Although there may be plenty of reasons why a car will not start, quite frequently a dead battery is to blame.

Car batteries can last for five years or more when properly cared for, but many batteries wear down and become inefficient within three years of daily use. According to the UK-based company Warranty Wise, car batteries deteriorate with every charge from a vehicle's engine. Naturally, drivers who are stranded by dead batteries wish they had done more to prevent their battery dying while they're on the road. Certain factors might offer clues as to how much life vehicle batteries have left.


- Longer start time: A dying battery may cause the engine to crank, but it can be slow to start or not seem to exude a lot of power.
- Cranks but doesn't start: You may turn the key to hear the engine trying to turn over, but it won't. Even if the vehicle eventually starts, have the battery checked and, if necessary, replaced by a mechanic.
- A jump start has been necessary: Batteries that have required a jump or multiple jumps are on their last legs and



should be replaced immediately.

- Dim lights or check engine indicator: Batteries powers the electric components in a vehicle, so dim lights could be indicative of a loss of power. Having the "check engine" light come on also can be a clue.
- Extreme temperatures: According to Firestone, hot or cold temperatures can shorten a battery's life. If you live in an extreme climate, your battery may not last as long as the manufacturer suggests it should.
- Short driving trips: People who take many short trips (less than 20 minutes each) may find their batteries do not have enough time to fully recharge, shortening their life expectancy.
- Pungent aroma: Leaking and corrosion around the battery terminals can cause battery issues. If there is a rotten egg smell under the hood, it may be a leaking battery on its way to dying.

Drivers can have their vehicle batteries tested by mechanics. Batteries can be replaced at home or at a garage. Servicing the vehicle frequently can prevent performance inefficiencies and help determine if any components are straining the battery and causing premature loss of battery life.



Successfully switch auto insurance providers

Once drivers purchase an auto insurance policy, many simply let the policy renew each year. But with a little digging, drivers may be able to reduce their insurance costs considerably.

- Research any cancellation fees. Before switching over, find out if there are any cancellation fees associated with an existing policy.
- Eliminate coverage gaps. Eliminate gaps in coverage by ensuring a new policy begins the moment the existing one ends. This prevents potential financial ruin should a driver get into an accident without any insurance during a gap period.
- Take note of any lifestyle changes. Be sure to list anything that can affect the cost of coverage, such as anti-theft devices on the vehicle, window etching or updated driving
- Explore union or group affiliations. Drivers who are members of particular clubs, professional organizations or something similar may be eligible for special policies with certain providers. Make a list of any affiliations and contact the organizers to see if they have relationships with auto insurance providers. Law enforcement personnel or veterans may be eligible for certain discounts as well. Some insurance carriers only cover police officers or former military. It pays to look into these discounts.
- Consider small companies. Just because they don't advertise as much as some of the more well-known providers does not mean small insurance companies are not capable of providing sufficient, affordable coverage. There are plenty of reputable small companies that offer excellent rates to drivers willing to exercise their due diligence.
- Check with the existing provider, too. Drivers can discuss their current rates and coverage with their existing insurance company, who may offer suggestions on reducing coverage or even offer lower prices in an effort to hang on to customers. Consider these possibilities before switching.



Safety first when traveling with pets

Pets' love is unconditional, so it's no wonder that pet parents want to keep their beloved animals by their side as much as possible. Pet owners whose pets spend ample time in the car should brush up on some safety precautions to ensure the roadways are safe for all travelers, including those covered in fur.

Driving while distracted is a significant safety concern. The AAA Foundation for Traffic Safety notes that simply taking one's eyes off the road for two seconds doubles the chances of being involved in a crash. Recent data from Kurgo, a leading supplier of quality dog travel supplies and accessories for active dogs, found that 60 percent of respondents had driven with pets in the last month, and more than half admitted to being distracted by their pets. Although the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration does not track how many accidents are attributed to pets, it's easy to see how pets can be a distraction on the road.

Drivers should never allow their pets to sit on their laps or ride in vehicles unless they are restrained. Doing so puts all passengers, pets and humans alike, in danger. AAA says a 10-pound dog that's not restrained can generate 500 pounds of force in a 50 mile per hour crash.

Pet owners can heed these safety guidelines to make trips with their pets less dangerous.

- Recognize that airbags can cause injury. Airbags are designed to protect people, not pets. It's always recommended that pets ride in the back seat or the storage area of an SUV in vehicles equipped with
- Watch those windows. Although riding with their heads out of the car window is a quintessential image of dogs in car, such situations put dogs in danger. Fast-blowing debris or litter can injure the dog, and heavy airflow can damage the animal's respiratory system, warn veterinarians. Dogs also may attempt to jump out.
- Invest in a restraint system. Vehicle restraint systems keep pets safe. Small dogs may benefit from being inside crates that are secured to the vehicle. Harnessing a pooch is another option, and many harnessess connect directly to seat belts. Dog gates and guards can be installed between the back seat and the storage bay area, which is great when traveling with multiple dogs.
- Avoid truck beds. The American Humane Society says pets should never be transported in the bed of pickup trucks. Dogs should only ride in pickup trucks with extended cabs that allow their owners to secure them in the backseat.

Keeping passengers, including both people and pets, safe in vehicles is the responsibility of drivers.



Improve the value of your trade-in

Trade-ins can reduce the cost of buying new vehicles and save drivers the hassle of selling their vehicles on their own.

Motorists who think trading in is the best way to unload their current cars can take various steps to improve the trade-in value prior to visiting the dealership.

- Know the trade-in market. Some trade-ins may be more valuable than others, even if the cars are relatively similar with regard to mileage. For example, preowned vehicle buyers typically prefer late model vehicles as opposed to cars that are older. This is even more apparent now that many car buyers want smartphone-friendly vehicles that afford them access to the apps and GPS systems on their phones. Drivers who want to get maximum value for their trade-ins may benefit by trading in a year or so earlier than they initially planned, as this will make their cars or trucks more attractive to prospective buyers.
- Address any issues. Dealerships will offer to tend to any repairs trade-ins may need, but that will come at a cost, which will be reflected in the trade-in value of the car. Vehicle owners should address any issues before taking their vehicles to the dealership.

Fix any doors that stick or minor scratches on the vehicle's exterior, remembering to have the car detailed, washed and waxed. Investigate if any major problems, such as engine troubles, are worth fixing on your own, or if you're better off receiving less for your trade-in.

- Keep maintenance records. Maintenance records illustrating that the vehicle was taken care of can help owners get more for their trade-ins.
- Shop around. Drivers who are not satisfied with the trade-in value assigned by a specific dealership can shop around until they find better offers. Some dealerships may not offer much for a vehicle because they already have a similar car or truck sitting on their lot, while others may jump at the chance to make their preowned inventory more diverse. Exercise patience when shopping around to reduce any frustration that might develop during the negotiation process.

Various factors impact the trade-in value of cars and trucks. When purchasing new cars, vehicle owners can employ various strategies to get the most money for their current automobiles.

Choosing a vehicle based on wheel drive

Several factors are considered before drivers purchase new vehicles. Wheel drive may not be the first such factor to come to mind, but it can be an important consideration when car shopping.

Despite the considerable rise in popularity of sport utility vehicles, automotive expert Edmunds says most passenger cars sold in the United States today use a two-wheeldrive system. With options such as 4WD, AWD, FWD and RWD, consumers should understand the differences of each type of drive in order to make the most informed decision.

Rear-wheel drive

With rear-wheel drive, the power goes to the back wheels to drive the vehicle. This used to be the system of choice because RWD systems were relatively easy to manufacture, offers Kelly Blue Book. RWD is the choice for many trucks because added load can offer additional traction in the back. Furthermore, rear-wheel drive is coveted for sporty vehicles and luxury cars. That's because, as vehicles accelerate the weight is transfered to the rear wheel, enhancing traction and further acceleration. This drive also

distributes weight more evenly, so cornering and handling is better.

Front-wheel drive

The National Motorists Association states that front-wheel drive, which has become ubiquitous in cars produced today, is cheaper to design and build than RWD. Fewer parts mean the drivetrain is easier to install. It is also less heavy than others, helping vehicles to be lighter and consume less fuel. In rain and snow, FWD has excellent traction, so it's an asset under poor weather conditions. Front-wheel drive vehicles are not prized for their handling because the front wheels have to put power to the ground and steer the car. Furthermore, unlike RWD, which is more rugged and durable, FWD is more fragile.

4-wheel-drive & All-wheel-drive

4WD is designed for rugged, off-road applications and AWD is for pavement driving. Pure 4WD is good for low-traction situations off of pavement, where additional grip is needed. In some 4WD vehicles, this drive needs to be engaged through a transfer switch. In such automobiles, the vehicle operates in FWD or RWD until that switch is engaged.



APART FROM passenger seating, horsepower and color, wheel drive should be a consideration when car shopping.

All-wheel-drive provides the best of FWD, RWD and pure 4WD systems. The main advantage is excellent traction on both dry pavement and in poor weather. Some AWD vehicles may be able to go off-roading as well. Potential disadvantages to AWD include cost, vehicle weight and, because there

are more components in AWD, more parts can fail and require servicing. AWD typically comes in part- and full-time versions.

Choosing a wheel drive requires an understanding of how one plans to use the vehicle and which attributes are most important.

Safety measures for winter drivers

Winter weather causes many people to retreat indoors until the spring thaw. However, for those who embrace the cooler temperatures or find that life must go on despite snow and ice, taking inventory of their vehicles is a must before the first snowflakes start to fall.

Tire care is an especially important area of vehicle maintenance. The tire experts at Michelin say that regular tires may be ineffective for winter driving. Summer tires are made from materials that are optimized for warm conditions. When the mercury drops, these same materials can harden, reducing their ability to grip the road. That lack of traction can be compounded by the presence of snow or ice. Even all-season tires, which are designed to be driven year-round, can be insufficient in severe weather conditions. Winter tires can help drivers safely navigate winter roadways.

Bridgestone Tires says that having the right snow tires matters when driving in winter weather conditions. It's important to look for tires that can disperse water sufficiently and also grip the road. Snow tires are designed to remain softer and more flexible to conform to the road better in cold conditions. Some winter tires are even studded to provide better traction.

Unfortunately, even the best winter tires cannot provide perfect traction on slippery roadways. That is why it is essential—in conjunction with the use of winter tires or snow chains — to modify driving techniques to navigate safely.



- Drive slowly. Slow down on winter roads. Allow a greater distance for stopping than for dry conditions. Slippery conditions can make it more challenging to stop, and excessive speeds can make the situation worse.
- · Shift into low gear. On hills, rely on low gears to maximize traction to travel up and down hills. This can minimize skids or sliding.
- Get the vehicle a tuneup. In addition to tires, be sure the braking system, battery and other major components of the vehicle are in good working order.
 - Replace windshield wipers. Reduced visibility can

compromise the safety of drivers and their passengers. Replace windshield wiper blades before winter arrives. Consider purchasing winter-rated windshield blades.

• Know how to recover from a skid. When skids occur on black ice or slush, drivers should take their feet off of the pedals and steer gently in the direction they want to go. As the vehicle regains traction, only then should the brakes or accelerator be applied.

Winter weather requires making some vehicle modifications, and drivers may want to alter the way they drive to be more safe on the road.





Help senior drivers maintain their independence

As men and women age, various factors may affect their ability to drive. In addition to issues with memory, seniors may have failing eyesight and physical limitations, and their reaction time may slow down. In such instances, seniors' ability to safely operate a motor vehicle may be questioned.

party like a Certified Driving Rehabilitation Specialist. This is a therapist who has special certification to assist people with disabilities, including older adults, with driving. They can help individuals with adaptive equipment or techniques if driving issues stem from something that can be addressed.

Figure out if the car "fits" the individual

A program called CarFit can help drivers assess if their car is suited to their abilities. A team of trained technicians and/or health professionals work with participants to ensure their vehicles are equipped for maximum safety and comfort. A properly adjusted vehicle is as important as one's cognitive and physical abilities. Adjustments can include mirror placement, good foot positioning and sitting at the proper distance from the steering wheel. People can learn about an upcoming event at www.car-fit.org.

Take a driver improvement course

Driver improvement courses are provided by various organizations, including some insurance companies. AARP also has a Driver Safety Course to lower the risk of traffic violations, collisions and injuries.



Completion of these courses can help drivers enhance their abilities behind the wheel and may result in lower premiums for mature drivers.

Keep the mind and body fit

Why clean air filters are important

Vehicle owners likely know to check fluid levels and get their cars' oil changed, but air filters may not be at the top of their maintenance checklists. Despite being a relatively inexpensive part, air filters often go overlooked.

Air filters have an important job in a vehicle, prolonging the life span of engines and helping cars run more smoothly and efficiently.

Purpose of vehicle air filters

Vehicle combustion engines operate with a mixture of fuel and air. Without oxygen, gasoline or diesel fuels cannot burn properly and power the engine. The air filter's job is to prevent dirt, dust and other debris from being sucked into an engine. Otherwise, grime can build up and impede engine performance or cause erosion of parts under the hood.

It is much more cost-effective to routinely change air filters than replace expensive engine parts. Rather than ignoring air filters until the last minute, drivers can take steps to keep filters clean and functioning at peak performance.

• Improve fuel efficiency. Clogged air filters reduce air flow to engines, resulting in

an improper ratio of air to fuel. As a result, spark plugs can be negatively affected and the engine may idle roughly or misfire. These scenarios can greatly affect fuel efficiency as well as cause engine deposits from rich fuel. To save money and trips to the fuel pump, replace filters regularly. According to GearHeads, for older cars, studies have indicated that by replacing a dirty air filter, one can improve gas mileage by as much as 14 percent.

- Reduce stress on the engine. Because of the air-to-fuel mix in engines, even a mixture that is slightly off balance can affect what is going on under the hood. That means the engine must work harder to get enough clean air into the chamber to complete the combustion cycle, says the Automotive Training Center.
- Enjoy more power. A filter that is saturated with dirt will restrict air flow. In such instances, drivers may notice a lack of power during acceleration. Replacing the filter can easily restore that pep.
- Reduce vehicle emissions. Environmental concerns are a priority for many people. By keeping the engine working properly,
