Young hunters harvest 13,759 deer during early youth portion of firearms deer season

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. – Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that young hunters ages 6 through 15 harvested 13,759 deer during Missouri's early youth portion of the 2022 deer hunting season, Oct. 29-30. Top counties were Franklin with 330 deer harvested, Osage with 310, and Howell with 260. Youth hunters harvested 15,608 during last year's early youth portion.

"Saturday's conditions were fairly comfortable for our young deer hunters," said MDC's Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle. "Although the rain we received in portions of the state on Sunday was much needed given the ongoing drought, it did put a bit of a damper on the latter half of the early youth portion."

Missouri's archery deer and turkey season continues through Nov. 11 and resumes Nov. 23 through Jan. 15, 2023. The November portion of firearms deer season runs Nov. 12-22 followed by the late youth portion Nov. 25-27. The antlerless portion of firearms deer season runs Dec. 3-11 (in open counties) followed by the alternative methods portion Dec. 24 through Jan. 3, 2023.

MDC reminds hunters to dispose of deer carcasses properly

SPRINGFIELD, Mo. – Proper disposal of a deer carcass is one of the final steps of the deer hunting process and is as important as any other part of deer hunting.

One reason this part of deer hunting is important is because there are regulations that pertain to the disposal of deer parts. In Missouri the improper disposal of deer parts falls under the state statute that covers the unlawful disposition of a dead animal. Deer hunters violate this statute (and commit a Class C misdemeanor) if they knowingly place or cause to be placed the carcass or offal of any dead animal:

- Into any well, spring, brook, branch, creek, pond, or lake
- On any public road or highway, river, stream, or watercourse or upon the premises not his or her own for the purpose of annoying another or others.

Besides the illegalities involved with the improper disposal of a deer carcass or its parts, dumping deer parts on the landscape is a way to spread chronic wasting disease (CWD), a disease that is fatal to deer. The infectious agent for CWD is a protein called a prion. Prions can remain viable on the landscape long after remains of an infected carcass decompose, which could potentially expose other deer to CWD. Hunters who harvest deer within the 38 counties that comprise Missouri's CWD management zone should remember there are special restrictions for those counties regarding deer carcass movement. A description of these regulations is in the "2022 Fall Deer and Turkey Hunting Regulations" booklet available at most MDC Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) offices and places that sell hunting and fishing permits.

Leaving deer parts on someone's property can also show a lack of courtesy on the part of a hunter. If a landowner who is unfamiliar with deer hunting and field-dressing comes across a gut pile on his/her land, your hunting on that property will probably be a one-and-done experience.

Here are proper disposal options hunters can use to get rid of their deer carcass parts:

- Place deer parts in trash or landfill. The best way to prevent the spread of CWD is to place carcass remains in trash bags and dispose of them through trash collection or at a permitted landfill.
- Bury deer parts on site. If you can't bag and place in trash or a permitted land-

Youth hunter connects with buck dad was hunting

Buckle your safety belts and keep your bow in hand, the time of year deer hunters dream about is upon us. The Hunter's Moon has come and gone, welcoming another fall. With the colorful display of red, orange and yellow foliage, and temperatures steadily dropping across the Midwest, it's time for the action to happen. The rut is about to roar.

The peak breeding time of the whitetail rut lasts about three weeks. We're not there yet. The period we are in is the pre-rut. Right now, bucks are busy establishing dominance and preparing

scrapes. They're starting to seek does. A lot of this activity is taking place after dark, but more bucks are showing up during daylight hours.

The rut progresses from north to south throughout the Midwest. Hunters in North Dakota will be into action before those in Southeast Kentucky. We'll be following along as this progression unfolds. We are going to be checking in throughout the region for the next seven weeks.

In Missouri, NWTF biologist JohnBurk said scrapes are popping up everywhere. John killed a dandy buck back in September, so he's been on doe patrol for the last few weeks, but his job keeps him in the woods and he said the bucks are active and making their preparations for peak breeding.

Southern Indiana deer hunter, David Ray, is reporting a lot more activity on his trail cameras. He said it is fun to watch the bucks physically change as their necks swell this time of year. Ray said now that most of the surrounding corn and soybean crops are out, his food plots are getting hammered, but most of the mature

bucks are still showing up after dark.

Now is a good time to try rattling. As mature bucks continue to establish dominance in their core area, they will not tolerate intruders, especially subordinate males. If you use rattling antlers to simulate a fight and the resident mature buck hears it, there is a good chance he will come to investigate and chase off any future competition.

Out in South Dakota, Brian Bashore serves as the Ex-

ecutive Director of Second Century Habitat Fund, which exists to raise funds for habitat conservation in the state. He spends a ton of time outdoors and reports a smaller bucks are starting to work scrapes during daylight. Bashore's big tip for deer hunters right now is to hunt where bumped bucks may escape to after being unwillingly forced to move. Lots of lazy bucks are kicked up out of their beds by pheasant hunters in the morning and afternoon. Even more are being pushed out of agriculture fields by combines.

"If you can hunt next to a cornfield while it's being harvested, you should take off work or do whatever you need to do to be in a stand over a route into adjacent cover. It's been so dry farmers are not having any problem getting the crops out, so very soon all those fields will be harvested," Bashore said.

Up in Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin, the home of the national headquarters of Whitetails Unlimited, Director of Communication Jeff Davis said, "As it gets cooler we should see more movement. I think we are still 2 to 3 weeks away from the peak rut up here. A lot of my co-workers are leaving work around 3 to get a couple hours in, but I don't know of anyone who has connected yet."


Over on the eastern side of the region in Ohio, the story is

about the same. Few big buck encounters are being reported. Norman Miller, the owner at Premier Outdoors in Mt. Hope, said, "Bucks have been moving ok around here. We've had three real nice ones come through the shop in the last week. The biggest was in the 180s and another was in the 170s. Last Tuesday and Wednesday were real good before it warmed up. It's supposed to cool down by the end of this week, so I expect the hunting will pick back up."

fill, bury carcass remains at or near where the deer was harvested. Bury deep enough to prevent access by scavengers. Burial will reduce (but not totally eliminate) the risks of spreading CWD.

• Leave on site: As a last resort, leave carcass remains on site (if this is agreeable with the landowner). While this will not prevent scavengers from scattering potentially infectious parts, the remains will stay in the general area where the deer was taken. If CWD is already present on the area, it will likely remain there and not be moved to another area. If you choose this option and it's agreeable with the landowner, ask if there's an out-of-the-way area where the landowner prefers that the deer remnants are deposited.



Now is also the appropriate time to stress firearm safety and range etiquette. When handling firearms always remem-

10 Commandments of Gun Safety:

- Firearms should be unloaded when not in use.
- Don't rely on your guns "safety". Treat every gun as though it can fire at any time, regardless of pressure on the trigger.
- Be sure of your target and what is beyond it.
- Always use correct ammunition.
- If your gun fails to fire when the trigger is pulled, handle with care.
- Always wear eye and ear protection when shooting.
- Be sure the barrel is clear of obstructions before shooting.
- Don't alter or modify your gun. Have it serviced regularly by a qualified gunsmith.
- Learn the mechanical and handling characteristics of the firearm you are using before going afield with it. Not all guns are the

Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) hosted an Oct. 18 Hunter Education Skills Session in partnership with Owensville Parks and Recreation Department in Memorial Park. MDC grant helps purchase track-chairs for Missouri disabled sportsmen

JEFFERSON CITY – Specialized trackchairs help the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) make nature and the outdoors more accessible to all outdoor enthusiasts. MDC recently awarded a grant to Missouri Disabled Sportsmen (MDS) to assist in the purchase of four track-chairs and an enclosed trailer. These all-terrain track-chairs will allow MDS to expand their services and create more opportunities for those they serve.

MDS is a non-profit organization with the mission of providing mobility-impaired, youth, and terminally ill youth outdoor enthusiasts with hunting, fishing, shooting sports, and outdoor educational opportunities in a safe and inclusive manner.

"Partnerships between MDC and organizations like MDS are integral to the Department's outreach efforts," said Education Outreach Coordinator Rob Garver. "We've partnered with MDS for several years and we're confident this grant and the new trackchairs will strengthen this relationship for years to come."

Track-chairs are off-road, electronic chairs that are designed for all terrain mobility. The chairs make the outdoors accessible for those with mobility issues. MDC currently has 14 track-chairs in its Missouri Accessible Outdoors Track-Chair Program. The all-terrain track-chairs are utilized for hunting, fishing, and other outdoor education events sponsored by MDC or partnering organizations. Four are located in Springfield, four in Kirksville, two in Cape Girardeau, and four in Kansas City.

MDS works with volunteer mentors, agencies, private landowners, and like-minded organizations to create opportunities for participants to pursue deer, upland birds, turkey, waterfowl, and fish, as well as participate in outdoor educational events throughout Missouri. With the addition of their own track chairs, MDS has the ability to expand their program offerings.

MDC reports hunters took eight black bears this season

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo. – The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reports that Missouri hunters harvested eight black

bears during the 2022 bear-hunting season, Oct.

More than 5,880 hunters applied during May for 400 permits for the season with the maximum total harvest being 40 bears. Of the 400 hunters selected through a random drawing of all applicants, 350 hunters purchased permits for the

Bear hunting in Missouri is limited to Missouri residents and restricted to three designated areas of southern Missouri called Bear Management Zones (BMZ). Each permit issued is for a specific BMZ and hunting is limited to public or private property within the BMZ.

All eight bears were harvested in BMZ 1 out of a maximum of 20 with 177 hunters purchasing permits to hunt the zone. No bears

were harvested in BMZ 2 out of a maximum of 15 with 128 hunters purchasing permits to hunt the zone. No bears were harvested in BMZ 3 out of a maximum of 5 with 45 hunters purchasing permits to hunt the zone.

This year, three of the eight bears harvested were taken with bows. During last year's inaugural season, all 12 black bears harvested were taken with firearms. MDC notes that an even ratio of male and female bears were harvested this year, similar to last.

"We anticipated a lower harvest this season over last," said MDC Bear Biologist Nate Bowersock. "Bears love gorging on

acorns in the fall and the acorn crop around the state was much more plentiful this season over last. This resulted in bears moving less often and being more dispersed, which made it more difficult for hunters to find them."
