Leach, team want another district title

Chamois has nine girls out for the 2020-21 basketball season under returning coach John Leach, and this year the Lady Pirates hope to win at least 15 games and make a run at another district title.
"We have some younger kids who are

still learning, so I'm not sure how it's going to look, but we're working hard to be competitive in every game," said Leach, competitive in every game," said Leach, who earned last year's Class 1 boys coach of the year honors from the Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association. "We have the ability and athleticism to compete at districts. It helps when you have strong senior leaders, and they're key to our success this year. At the same time, the players returning from that district championship run will have to step up because other teams will be guarding our best players.'

Seniors Katie Keilholz (5-6) and MaKenna Wuelling (5-5) were instrumental in last year's district championship, and senior Veronica Slack (5-11) has experience from two previous years to offer.

"Katie led us in scoring last year and brings a different level of shooting to the mix," said Leach. "She has the ability to get open and get the shot off, even though she was in a box-and-one in most games last year or heavily guarded. They keyed on her because teams knew she was a threat, and still, she found a way to overcome that extra attention.

Keilholz last year averaged 18.2 points a game to go with 3.8 RPG, and 2.2 SPG, while recording 11 blocks, and hitting 37% from beyond the arc, and 83.7% from the stripe, She was a first-team Show-Me Conference selection and was the top vote-

District honors. Keilholz broke the school record for three-pointers last year with 66, which helped her gain Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association first-team All-District honors for the third

straight season.

Wuelling as the team's point guard stepped up for the last two years, averaging 14.4 points a game and 6.4 rebounds. "They forgot about her a little bit last year but that won't happen again because teams know what she can do," said Leach. "She has great knowledge of the floor and who's open and where to put the hell."

open and where to put the ball."
Wuelling added 44 three-pointers on the year and averaged four assists per game while hitting 78.1% from the stripe. She is a returning All-District (MCBA and Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association) and All-Conference player.

Wuelling is on track to break 1,000 points this year, with 843 at the start of the season.

Slack will provide some defense in the middle.

"Veronica knows the plays and understands what we're trying to do," said Leach. "With her size, she can be effective in the paint. She brings a big presence defensively, and has an opportunity to be a big rebounder for us."

Slack last year posted 36 rebounds.
Juniors are 5-10 post player Abby
Keilholz and 5-6 guard Ariel Owens.

"Abby brings size to the floor, and has made a lot of improvements since last year," said Leach. "She hasn't played a lot of basketball but she's come a long way. She'll be able to come into the game and

guard other big players. Abby will see a lot of time as she balances defensive duties with Veronica."

Keilholz last season had 55 rebounds. Owens has made leaps and bounds since last year. "She's been a vocal leader on the floor after stepping up mid-season last year," said Leach. "Her defensive presence in the district tournament last year was very important. She is understanding more about what she can do and will be a solid starter for us.'

Owens finished last year with 3.9 rebounds per game while posting 16 steals. Sophomore Alex Mckague (5-4 guard)

has also gone from being a tentative player to more comfortable as she expands her knowledge. "I think she'll get more time than she did last year because of her improvements," said Leach.

Freshmen guards Madeline Gerloff (5-7), Eevie Halbert (5-5), and Elsey

Wuelling (5-2) round out the squad.
"Madeline can shoot the ball and plays good defense," said Leach. "She's inexperienced at this level right now but she will have a big presence inside. I think

she'll continue to improve and really help us down the stretch."

Halbert is all over the place. "She just doesn't stop," said Leach. "Eevie gets after it on both sides of the ball, and I expect her to provide us a lot of energy this year.

E. Wuelling is a raw player who's learning the ropes. "She wants to play and I just hope she keeps making progress,

Chamois Pirates take the court under new head coach

Bates is no stranger to competition, especially with a smaller group of players.

"I feel I've done my best coaching at small schools," said Bates. "I know the tradition here at Chamois is that kids want to play. Even with the COVID stuff over the summer, parents and kids were asking about open gym. We had it, and kids showed up like crazy."

This opportunity allows him to coach both junior high and varsity teams. "That gives me a chance to get them started in seventh grade, and by the time they begin high school ball, they know what to expect, and hopefully they're prepared when they

Bates also said this position allowed

him to return to his roots in a rural setting.

A 1995 graduate of Moberly High School, Bates earned his Associate's Degree from MACC in 1997 and completed his BS in secondary education at Columbia College in 2002.

He coached first as a student assistant at Columbia College for three seasons and was also a team manager at Moberly Area Community College before transferring to the University of Tennessee-Martin.

"We had kids getting Division I offers and I started getting letters too," said Bates.
"It didn't work out but getting to work with amazing. He's a Hall of Fame coach, and I have always been a sponge for basketball information."

He was a graduate assistant at the University of the Cumblerlands, an NAIA school in southeastern Kentucky at Williamsburg, where he was a manager for the team.

"I took in what Don Butcher had to teach," said Bates. "I feel grateful to have worked with him for two years."

Upon completion of his master's degree in education, he returned to Missouri and began as an assistant coach in the 2004-05 season at Community R-6 at Laddonia.

From there he went to MACC, where he was an assistant men's coach for two years

"When I left Moberly I had a chance to get some high school jobs," said Bates, who went to work at the Steelville school district. "I've learned a lot from my experience at various places.'

Bates held head-coaching positions at Cainsville, Tarkio, Humansville, and Hogan Preparatory Academy in Kansas City, and was an assistant coach at Potosi, Madison, and Washington High School in Kansas City.

"Last year was a crazy season," said Bates of his time at Hogan Prep, as he lost his mother in January, and had a tough time closing out the season. "I love it here at Chamois and I look forward to many great

Bates and his fiancee, Kimberly Patridge, have three children, freshman

Brittney Patridge, Russell Patridge, 11, and Sophia Patridge-Bates, 4. All are attending school at Chamois.

"The kids have been great," said Bates of his players, who have accepted his leadership without difficulty. "The junior high kids showed up every day and worked hard, and got better all the time. We only played six games but I wanted to put an exciting brand to the game, and I think we'll do the same in high school.'

Many of the things Chamois will use this year Bates has seen in previous positions.

"I'm like every other coach," said Bates. "I beg, borrow, or steal from the experiences I've had or from what I've seen other coaches do."

Bates believes in balance but loves to teach defense. "If you can defend successfully, you give yourself a chance to win every night, no matter how talented you are," he added. "I've been blessed to work with a variety of coaches who played many different styles of defense. I feel like I can adapt my coaching style to the players I have, and that works for both offense or defense. Some coaches like to play one style of offense or defense because that's what they know, but I will mix it up based on the team we're playing and our strengths.

While Chamois is low on numbers with only eight players, Bates said he believes all of them will contribute in some



"My five starters are going to be solid, and those coming off the bench will be able to do things to help us," he added. "We can play man defense and a variety of zones, and the kids flat get after it in our drills. They know what I want them to do, and they love it."

Starters will depend on how Bates chooses to approach his opponents.

With the group we have this year, the three bench players will be great support players," said Bates. "Everyone that wants

to play has to find a way to help us in a positive way. That doesn't mean going out and scoring 25 points. Rebounding and defense are equally important, along with handling the ball and not committing a bunch of turnovers. If they can do that, we'll find a way to get these guys on the floor. We have eight guys that can help one way or another."

Seniors are 6-2 forward Nate Nolte and 6-1 forward Eli Deppe.

"Nate can play outside and in," said Bates. "He's very versatile, and so far, he's the poster child for a high school basketball player. He loves to be in the gym, listens, pushes his tail off, and he's a great teammate. Nate gives them instruction to help them do things the right way and be in the right spot. I'm going to be really excited to see his senior season."

Bates said Nolte has been at every open gym since July and is a good example to others. "I have high expectations for him and I think he's going to have a great season," said Bates.

Last year, Nolte scored 20.3 PPG, to go with 5.6 RPG, 72.7% from the FT line, and 34% from three-points range. He earned First team Show-Me, All District (Class 1, District 9) and Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association All-District honors.

Deppe is a great competitor and very athletic. "He's also very strong," said Bates. "I think he will be a force around the basket for us. He had some great nights last year with a lot of rebounds and scoring and I hope that continues. Eli runs the floor very well and can guard anyone, anywhere. His speed is impressive, and he'll score eight or 10 points by just outrunning people to the other end of the floor. Like Nate, I expect

Eli to be a strong leader for us both on and off the floor. These guys will offer guidance to help the younger guys prepare to step into their roles next year.

Deppe ended the 2019-20 year with 11 points and 12.9 rebounds per game. He earned Central Missouri Sportswriters & Sportscasters Association All-District and Show-Me honorable mention honors.

Most teams will likely focus on the seniors.

"We have other guys that are complementary to our seniors that can help us win ball games," said Bates.

Juniors include 5-7 guard Ethan Halbert, 5-9 guard Caine Schaben, 5-10 guard Mason Lamb, and 6-1 forward Eli Paulsmeyer.

"Ethan comes to practice every day ready to work," said Bates. "He'll dive on the floor and get after it on every play. He's always trying to improve, and there's a role for him to help us this year. He'll be a roleplayer that can come in and give us minutes.

Schaben will be the team's primary point guard. "Caine competes like everyone else," said Bates. "He understands the game and is a solid defender. If he can take care of the basketball, we're going have a good year."

Lamb is an athletic wing that brings the ability to defend to the floor. "He can also rebound, and when you add that he can put the ball on the floor, Mason, like Caine, will complement the seniors very well as they learn what it takes to be leaders so they can step into that role next year," said

Paulsmeyer brings some size and a rugged approach to play around the basket but he can step out and take a shot as well. "He has a nice touch around the rim," said Bates. "He missed some time due to quarantine but he's working himself back into shape, and I think we'll see him bring a lot to the team this year."

The lone sophomore is 5-10 guard Shannon Cowans, and there is one freshman, 5-10 guard Chris Slusser.

'Shannon is very athletic and brings guard and ball-handling skills to the team, said Bates. "He can knock down the shot and he's learning how to be competitive. Shannon will be someone who others will have to guard on the perimeter. When it's all said and done, I also think he'll be a pretty good defender."

Slusser is making the adjustment to the high school level but is a lot like Cowans. "He'll be a good guard option off the bench to come in and give us some minutes," said Bates. "He's learning how hard you have to play and the physicality of high school ball but he doesn't back down from it. I think he'll be a good addition to the guards so he can step in and there won't be a huge dropoff when he's on the floor. He'll be in a position to help us for the next several years.

Bates is ready for whatever comes the Pirates' way.

"I'm excited for this group," said Bates. "We're the little guy in this conference but if people take us lightly, I think they're going to be surprised.'

Chamois was forced to shut down for a while due to COVID, with one player having tested positive and most of the others in quarantine due to contact. The Pirates had to withdraw from the Linn Jamboree, which has since been canceled but hope to have everyone back in time to start the year against Vienna.

Most of these players are coming off a fall season that had its share of challenges, particularly with COVID, and Leach isn't taking any chances.

We're taking it a day at a time," said Leach. "I hope we get to play as much as possible and stay healthy and be able to finish out the season, especially for my seniors. I want them to have a good finish to their careers.

Leach is looking for a return to the district championship game and defense of the Lady Pirates' title, his first as head

Chamois last year finished 15-9 after a tough loss in the sectional round to Community R-6. In that contest, Chamois hit 29.7% from the floor, with a 3-12 mark from three-point range (25%) and a 14-17 performance at the free-throw line (82.4%).

Keilholz, who posted a team-high 18 points, went 8-8 from the stripe, while Wuelling was 6-6 from the line as part of

her 16 points. Keilholz hit two treys and Wuelling had one.

Defense was the name of the game in

last year's district championship win.

"Our defense was stellar tonight, and that's what won it," said Leach after that game. "We got our offense going in the second half. I can't be any more proud. It's overwhelming. Everything's kind of falling into place this year. Being a small school and playing the schedule we play, and getting beat up, and coming back is just a credit to the girls."

Prior to last year, the Lady Pirates had last won a district title the year Chamois went on to finish second in the state, but none of last season's players had been part of a district championship, and Leach said it was a great experience for them.

"We had a very tough season, and to

have a winning record against our opponents is a plus for the girls," said each in recapping the district tournament. "They've come a long way since day one, and I couldn't be any more proud of the way these girls have worked.

So far this year, the Lady Pirates have continued to work hard, and Leach is pleased. "We will have challenges this season but they're up for it," he said.














Linn Wildcats to field a senior-laden team

After ending the 2019-20 season in the semifinals to finish 18-8, the Linn Wildcats are back and itching for a better run in districts, though the certainty of reaching that point in the year is not clear.

We expect to compete for a district title regardless of what district we find ourselves in," said Coach Clay Crouch. "That's always the goal, to win our district, and these guys will do everything they can to make that happen.

Linn has eight seniors who will play varsity, led by Caleb Maassen, a 6-4 guard/ forward.

"He's expanded his game and has a lot of experience, having started since he was a sophomore," said Crouch. "We need him to score more this year for us to be successful, and we need him to continue being our key rebounder. He handles pressure pretty well and I'm looking for a big year from him."

Last year, Maassen scored 12.9 points and grabbed 6.7 rebounds per game while hitting 64.8% from the floor, and 75% from the line. He was All-District following the Class 2 District 8 tournament, earned second-team All-District from the Central Missouri Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association, and was first-team All-Conference,

Alek Peters (5-8) returns as the Wildcats' point guard. "He had a big year last season and we hope to see him expand on that," said Crouch, as Peters scored 9.7 and collected 4.2 rebounds a game to go with 3.5 pretty steady presence with the ball, he's a good shooter and one of our better defenders. We'll need him to score a little more than last year."

Peters was All-District following the Class 2 District 8 tournament and earned second-team All-Conference last year.

Austin McKim, a 6-2 guard/forward, will see his role expand from last year. "We expect him to be more of an offensive player but he's also a good defender so he offers some good versatility on the floor," said Crouch.

Last year, McKim posted five points, 2.4 rounds, and 1.7 assists per game, and hit 36.4% from three-point range.

Andy Hueste, a 5-8 guard, scored 4.2 points a game and covered 34.3% of his three-point shots. "He's one of our leaders this year," said Crouch. "He works extremely hard and we'll look to lean on him a little more offensively this year.'

Caden Robinson (5-8 guard) is a solid defender and does a lot of things that don't show up in the stats. "He's a reliable ball-handler and we're looking for an expanded role from him this year," said Crouch.

Drew Strope (6-2 forward) improved over the summer on the offensive end. "We

lost some height to graduation so we'll need him to step up and score and provide some leadership," said Crouch. "He's also a pretty solid defender."

Hayden Phillips, a 5-9 guard, will be tapped to provide some energy on the floor. "We need him to help us and hopefully he'll be able to give us a boost," Crouch said. "I was impressed with what I saw during fall baseball, and we hope he can build on that as we head into basketball.

Crouch said he has a lot of confidence in the cohesion these players have.

"This group has been playing together their whole lives so they know how to play with one another really well," he added.

Kaleb Brandt (6-1 forward) is in his first year with the program. "He's getting used to playing our style, acclimating to our system and philosophy," said Crouch. "We hope he can be a big physical presence inside.

Overall, Crouch said the varsity squad should be competitive. "I think we have a chance to be good but that is always based

on practice and our ability to defend," he said. "We have different strengths this year than the last few years. We are going to be smaller and quicker so we are going to try to pick up the pace of the game. Obviously, this year is going to be a challenge for everyone with COVID but I feel good about the group we have.'

"We always want to compete for a conference title and we've been in the hunt recently," said Crouch. "There are some quality teams in the conference, and we'll have to be ready.'

"These guys show up every day and work hard in practice," said Crouch. "They're showing improvement all the time and we'll need them to be ready to step in, especially with this COVID situation."

Linn has two sophomores on the roster, Zach Dodson (6-2 forward), and Landen Bennett (5-9 guard).

"I give these guys a lot of credit because from where they started, they've made a lot of progress," said Crouch.

Freshmen are Noah Hall (5-8 guard), Zach Hatfield (5-11 forward), Lucas Collins (5-9 forward), Ashton Keilholz (5-9 guard), Shane Greer (5-8 guard/forward), Seth Wolfe (6-0 forward), Curtis Deeken (5-9 guard/forward), Hank Klouzek (5-8 guard), Christopher Brandt (5-10 forward), Jett Maasen (5-4 guard), and Tanner Hackmann (5-8 guard/forward).

"This is a good group of incoming freshmen," said Crouch. "There's a lot of talent and they just need to continue developing and practicing. We look forward to seeing them improve and help us down the road on





aggressive," said Moore. "The girls are working hard in practice and as they continue to develop their skills and gain experience, I expect them to help us at the varsity level at some point."



Brandt said she thought coaching was something she'd considered later in life, but for now, this is a great fit. She earned a degree in biology from Columbia



"She's probably been our most consistent shooter, and we need that to continue to give us another longrange gunner off the bench. She played a lot of minutes last year so she'll be a solid senior.

she is almost 100 percent and trusting herself. We'll need her to hold down the middle for us, especially against bigger teams.

Luebbering averaged 10.1 points and five rebounds per game through eight before she was injured.

Eichholz will back up Brandt in the point-guard position. "She's a high-energy kid that makes things happen when she's on the floor," said Baker. "Anna is very good off the dribble and attacking, and gets to the rim probably as well as anyone in the program. If she makes good decisions and limits her turnovers, she'll see minutes at the varsity level.'


Coach John Fick said he's looking these players to be aggressive on offense.



Assistant Coach Les Rosenborough returns and he and Strope have been coaching together for nine years.





Robertson excited about size, depth of team

Fatima returns to the hardwood after a strong offseason and while the overall numbers are down this year, Coach Ryan Robertson is looking forward to a good

"We are as excited as I can remember, heading into a season, in terms of where we are at, talent-wise, depth-wise, and our basketball IQ," said Robertson. "These kids have worked hard in the off-season, put on weight, and gotten stronger. We feel they're mentally stronger than they were a year ago, and I think the biggest difference will be our ability to score inside. We won't have to rely as much on our guards scoring 50 a game to win. We should get some good contributions from our post players, especially on nights when we're not shooting that well, and still have a chance to win.

After ending last year in the district semis against Blair Oaks, Fatima (17-10 last year) shrugged it off and hit the gym and there hasn't been a discussion about expectations for this year's district tournament.

We haven't talked about it, nor will we, and we don't even know yet who's in our district," said Robertson. "I just want us to be the best version of ourselves in every game we play. Our schedule is loaded, and we will compete every time we step onto the court. We'll worry about districts down the road.'

Fatima had a share of the conference title last year, and Robertson hopes to be there again. "These kids have been in this line-up for three years, and have taken some lumps from some of these teams over the years, so hopefully they have the mentality that it's their year to avenge some of the losses we've had," said Robertson.

Leading the team are seniors Carter Karst, a 6-0 2-guard, Dawson Huhn-Meyer, a 6-1 3-guard, and 6-1 forward Luke Boyce.

"Carter is one of the best overall defensive players the program," said Robertson. "He's been blessed with Robertson. "He's been blessed with excellent foot speed and very high basketball IQ. On the offensive end, he's a knockdown shooter and understands the offense well. Defensively, he will be given the opponents' best offensive player to guard when he's in the game.

Huhn is a very athletic player. "He's very hard-nosed and his shot has improved tremendously over the last four years," said Robertson. "His effort and energy are very contagious throughout the program. He will provide a big lift for us on both ends of the floor.'

Boyce is the definition of toughness, Robertson said. "He's a player that invites contact in the paint, is one of our best rebounders and he leads by example."

Unterrified Democrat

Junior Lee Verslues (5-10) may move to the 2-guard position this year. "His ability to shoot the ball and with the emergence of Cooper Kleffner as the point guard will give us more opportunities to get Lee some more looks at the basket," said Robertson.

Verslues was named second-team All-District by the Central Missouri Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association and earned second-team All-Conference honors.

Leo Peters, a 6-5 junior center, has elevated his game as much as anyone through the summer. "His physique has been transformed due to his work in the weight room and we look for him to be one of the best post players in the area," said Robertson.

Junior Jacob Vanderfeltz, a 6-2 3-guard, has also hit the weight room. "He's added muscle and speed to his arsenal," said Robertson. "He's a player we're going to convert to a guard, although he will remain one of the best rebounders in the program. He can hurt opponents in a number of ways, with his ability to shoot, defend, and score inside.

Nate Lehmen, a 6-4 junior center, returns with some good varsity experience. "We'll look for him to add muscle and size to the post," said Robertson. "He's another player who can stretch the defense with his shooting ability and he can score with his back to the basket.

Carson Schulte, a 5-11 2-guard, is a good three-point shooter. "His knowledge of the game has come along way over the last year," said Robertson.

Several sophomores are expected to significant varsity time this year.

Ty Fortson (5-10 point guard/2-guard) has come along way since the summer. "He's now playing under control and has been shooting the ball extremely well so far," Robertson.

Nathan Brandt, a 6-2 2-guard, had a good off-season with plenty of summer league play. "We think he's taken his game to yet another level," said Robertson. 'We'll rely on him to be a leader and will have a shoot-first mentality.

Brandt was named second-team All-District by the Central Missouri Sportswriters and Sportscasters Association and earned second-team All-Conference honors

Cooper Kleffner (6-0 point guard) will change things up. "His role this year may be the biggest yet," said Robertson. "We are going to rely on him to run the point and to orchestrate the offense. He is the engine of the bus and we will go as he

Jack Robertson, a 6-1 3-guard, has several offensive strengths. "Jack brings a lot of basketball smarts to the table as well as pinpoint accuracy from the three-point line," said Robertson. "He will be one of our zone-busters because if it feels like leather, Jack wants to put it toward the

Blake Gentges (5-9 point guard/2guard) joined the team right after the soccer season ended. "We know what he can give us," said Robertson. "He'll be one of the best defensive players in the area and anything he gives us on the offensive end will be a bonus."

Jacob Schulte (5-11 3-guard) is a tough, defensive player. "He thinks about the team first, and will often guard the best player we see on the other team on whatever level he plays, be it varsity or JV," said Robertson.

Other sophomores include Alex Reinkemeyer (5-9 guard), and Kayden Struemph (5-11 post).

"Alex and Kayden have been doing a

good job of leading the younger players in practice," said Robertson. "They continue to bring positive attitudes every day.

Freshmen are Levin Robinson (6-5 post), and Easton Haslag (5-11 guard),

"For Levi, the sky's the limit in terms of his ability," said Robertson. "His combination of size and athletic ability is rare, and he has been very coachable. which might be his best attribute. Easton has not yet joined the team due to cross country but hopefully, with his shooting ability he'll be able to provide us some scoring opportunities.

Freshman Nolan Jaegers (5-10 guard) is a very good athlete, Robertson noted. "With a willingness to improve himself every day, he's eager to learn the nuances of the game," the coach added.
