

Chamois volleyball season delayed by COVID

Just five practices into the fall season, the Chamois volleyball team ran into a COVID situation and was put on quarantine until Tuesday, Aug. 24. As a result, the first two matches have been pushed back so the team can complete the required practices before the start of the season.

"We were looking really strong and the girls were doing well in practice," said Coach Samantha Mitchem, who will be joined again by assistant coaches Katie Kuschel and Leshia Kempker. "We didn't have the option to do remote practices as a group, but I'm very proud of the girls for conditioning on their own when they could."

Mitchem added that practicing together is key to success. "We need to be able to work on things together at the same time as we continue to develop our skills," she said. "I'm confident that once we get back together, the girls will pick up where they left off."

This year's squad has one serior, Ariel

This year's squad has one senior, Ariel Owens, who will be a right-side hitter. "She's a four-year starter so I expect her to be a big part of the team," said Mitchem. "She has the potential to be a great leader on the floor and she's working on it. Ariel is a good hitter and blocker and has made some great passes so far in practice. I think she's stronger than last year."

Owens earned honorable mention All-Conference last year.

Junior Alex McKague is the only player in her class and will spend time as a setter on the floor. "Her passing is much improved over last year, and I think she'll get better with more experience." said Mitchem.

The largest group is the six sophomores, most of whom return with a year of experience.



Elsey Wuelling, meanwhile, will attack from the outside. "She's small but mighty," Mitchem said. "Her serves have been solid, and her hits are amazing for a girl her size."

Devin Slusser will be the team's liber and right-side hitter. "She's a very versatile player who reads the ball well," said Mitchem. "I expect her to be very involved in our success."



Chamois cross country team returns with five high school and five JH runners, under the direction of Coach John Leach.

While there aren't enough for a team score but with the changes in the district meet, Leach said a few runners may advance

"If their times get there, they have a good chance, and I think they will," said Leach. "We've seen some improvements in our times during practice. Our basic techniques are getting better and we're running farther, so they're starting to get in pretty good shape.

Leach said there is a lot of work yet to be done before the first meet at New Haven but he's confident runners will be ready.

The team has three sophomores in Madeline Gerloff, Eevie Halbert, and Elsey

"Madeline is a very talented runner," said Leach. "I think she'll be the top runner and will do much better than she did last year. My goal for her is to get to the state

Halbert has the talent to succeed. "We're working with her to develop the understanding that she can be a fast runner," said Leach.
"She has a chance of finishing in the top 30 and competing at state.'

Wuelling is determined to make a splash. "She's quiet but really wants to do well, and has a real opportunity to put up times close to Madeline's, and she could possibly get to state as well."

"Rylee has done very well in practice," said Leach. "She'll be a dark-horse runner that will come out of nowhere at the end of the year. Her form has improved and she's getting better every day. Rylee could get to state as well, depending on how the season

The lone boy on the team is freshman Caleb Keilholz. "He's a joy to coach," said Leach. "He does everything possible that I ask him to do, and with the top 30 going to state, he has a chance to get there even as a freshman. He runs hard every time out and I feel he'll do very well this year.

Chamois also has four junior high boys running: Evert Mehmert, Jaxon Wuelling, Kaden Wuelling, and Jack Schollmeyer.

These four boys were on last year's champion conference team. "I'm expecting a lot out of these guys," said Leach. "Even though we can't defend our team title, my goal is to get all of them in the top 10 individually. They are all province better 10. individually. They're all running better than they were last year, and having them get as many medals as possible through the season is a priority.'

Seventh-grader Emma Mehmert is the lone JH Lady Pirate. "She's very athletic and I think she'll improve immensely throughout the year," said Leach. "Her workouts are better every day, and I look forward to seeing her develop.



"We're not going to run away with anything but these girls are working hard and I think we'll hang with most teams," she



Returning Linn cross country coach Robyn Baker said she hopes for a better district finish to get the whole team to the state meet.

"I can't do anything about COVID but last year was difficult," she said. "I'm so proud of the two ladies who made it to the state meet, and I want to build on that. We are doing everything we can to keep everyone healthy so we can avoid having to quarantine our athletes, especially as we get close to districts."

Baker added that she wants each runner to reach their potential. "These kids worked so hard last year and are back at it after summer conditioning," she said. "I want the best for them.

The Lady Cats' returners include Myra Baker, a senior, and sophomore Ramsie Tschappler, both of whom competed at the state meet last year.

Baker, who earned 35th in 22:55, just 10 spots away from All-State, brings a lot of running experience to the table. "She has a lot of grit and determination," said Coach Baker. "She got a taste and wants to get back to state, and the fact is, she just loves to run, so I expect her to do well.

Tschappler entered last year's season as a freshman with a good foundation from her time at St. George. "She was solid from the start and adjusted to the pace of high school pretty well," said Baker. "She figured out what it took to get to state and

competitive again this year."

Tschappler finished 62nd in 23:37 last season at the state meet.

Another senior, Ellie Monnette, is a vocal part of the team and shares leadership qualities with Myra Baker. "If Ellie wanted to be a coach, she could do it easily," said Coach Baker. "She's a good leader and she works hard at everything she does. Ellie knows what it takes to be strong and help the team, and I'm excited to see how well she does.'

Juniors are John Schmidt, Jason Powers, Trenton Burnett, and Rhett Robinson, all of whom have shown growth.

"John pushes Jason and both have done a good job in the off-season," said Baker. "They are pushing themselves to be in the best possible cross country shape."

Robinson is proving himself as a leader. "He's a strong runner and I hope he's a big part of our success this year,' said Baker.

Burnett didn't run varsity last year but his hard work has put him in a great position to break through this year. "He's a very good distance runner," said Baker. "I expect he'll meet his goals and be a big part of the varsity squad.

Sophomore Hank Klouzek returns

after a strong freshman season. "He entered last year with a lot of middle school experience and got his high school pace figured out pretty quickly," said Baker. "He's going to continue to improve and be a successful runner.'

Freshmen are Zachary Thiel-Henson and Bobby Winkelman.

After running his seventh-grade year, Thiel-Henson did not run last year but is in good shape coming into this season.



they will do well.'

All six of Linn's juniors return for the third straight year.



When Gier is not pitching, she will play at first base. "This will be an opportunity to showcase her strengths more in the field," said Schnieders.

Luebbering, who earned second-team All-District and All-Conference honors after last year's performance, returns to the catcher's position. "She's a wall behind the plate," said Schnieders. "She knows the game and is a great teammate. She's also the voice of the team and a good leader. We need her to step up and control the game."

On the rubber, Gier handled the lion's share, with 144 innings pitched and a record of 11-11. She allowed 63 earned runs on 171 hits with 102 strikeouts and 29 walks

Eichholz is a returning outfielder. "She

has been more consistent out there, and she has one of the top arms on the team," said Schnieders. "She brings a lot of game experience to the team and we look for her to be as strong in the box as she is in the field.'

Eichholz went 10-39 (.256) with four doubles and two RBI.

This year's junior class includes Ellie Brune (OF), Caleigh Huot (OF), Allison Schwartze (3B/SS), Olivia Reichel (OF), and Rachel Woehr.

Woehr had a pretty rough summer due






played a role in this year's varsity selection.

Fatima has nine freshman volleyball players



Freshmen Kinzey Woody (3B/SS) and Kristen Robertson (2B/IF) join the varsity team and are expected to be impact players.




