Art Works on Main schedules youth, amateur Plein Air events

rt Works on Main Gallery, located on historic First Street in Owensville, is hosting two annual Plein Air events in 2022, along with one-day experiences.

Chrysa Niewald is on the committee for the October Plein Air.

"We already have the events scheduled for Oct. 19-23," Niewald said. "We already have 24 artists signed up as of (March 26). It is a sign that we are successful because artists have already signed up for it."

The October Plein Air event is five-days-long. Artists paint in various prepared locations throughout the county.

"There are different locations every year," Niewald explained. "We are still working on locations for this year and I know Manuela (Woolsey) and Suzie (Jost) will be checking out some private farms."

Last year the group arranged for a painting at Peaceful Valley Lake outside of Owensville. On Friday and Saturday, they painted in Owensville, Rosebud, and the farm at Cool Cow Cheese.

The location of the 2022 Plein Air event has yet to be determined.

They try to do one private estate and someone's farm with good scenery," Niewald explained. "I think we will probably have the quick paint scheduled, tentatively, on Oct. 21."

Suzie Jost, who is on the Fall Plein Air planning committee, explained the quick paint event.

"The artists have two hours from

start to finish and they are amazing to watch," Jost said.

The locations of the quick paints are also pre-determined. "They paint all three days. Sunday is the finale with the sale of the paintings at White Mule Winery."

At the end of each day during the event, artists may display paintings at the Seasons of Faith Church. The artwork is for sale.

"Paintings can be sold as they are hanging," Jost said. "You could approach an artist and purchase a painting on the spot. If the artists want to sell it, they can. Usually, they want to wait until after judging because if they win, they get a prize. They have a lot of flexibility."

from the painting events as well.

"We like for the public to watch the artists as much as possible," Jost said. "It is awesome to see them paint, especially the quick paints. They can make something out of a pile of weeds!"

The gallery recently added a youth division with the help of the Bayer Grant, according to Pam Ellis.

"We are adding a youth division with 30 spots for ages 10 to 15-years-old," Ellis said. "We are hoping that students can learn from the Plein Air events, like quick paints at Spring Fest for ages 15-years-old and up."

The Bayer Fund Rural Community Arts Program Grant from the Arts Education Council awarded Art Works on Main \$2,400 to help host the youth events and pay for supplies.

"We are trying to get everything else going," Ellis said.



or over 70 years, the annual Gasconade County Fair has provided plenty of entertainment to unofficially wind down the summer months in Gasconade County and the surrounding area.

Held at Memorial Park (off Highway 28) in Owensville every year since 1947, the fair has numerous activities for children and adults of all ages.

Kids activities have included a nickel scramble, kiddie tractor pull, carnival rides, livestock and animal shows, a parade to collect candy and other items given out along with a Little Mr.

Oak Ridge Boys Friday, July 29, 2022 8:30 p.m. on the main stage

and Miss Gasconade County and Gasconade County Fair Queen contests.

Exotic animal shows and game shows for kids have also appeared at the fair over the vears.

Activities primarily geared for adults have included bull riding, a demolition derby, truck and tractor pulls, motocross, a barbecue cook off and live music by local and national artists.

The headline entertainer for this year's fair is



Very third weekend in July, in the small town of Rosebud, enthusiasts of old-time farming gather at the Rosebud Community Park for the annual Gasconade County Threshers Association's Steam Engine and Threshing Show.

Formed in August of 1962, the Gasconade County Threshers started their annual show as a part of the Gasconade County Fair.

Moved to Rosebud Community Park in July of 1966, the Gasconade County Threshers Association's annual show has only grown.

In recent years, the number of tractors, steam engines and old gasoline engines has pushed 200.

The show's main objective is to demonstrate to the younger generation how old steam tractor engines were used to supply power for plowing, threshing, sawing, grinding and other farm-related tasks.

Recently, popular activities during the show have included a draft horse pull, parade of tractors and steam engines, tractor pulls, a watermelon eating contest, a cast-iron skillet throwing contest for women, a fiddle and banjo contest, a hay bale toss, car show and pedal-tractor pulls for kids and adults.

Where there are activities, great food isn't far away. Popular food options include pulled beef, hamburgers, brats, hot dogs, fish sandwiches, fries and nachos. Beverage choices include beer, soda, lemonade, tea and coffee.

Traditionally, fried chicken dinners are also served the third and final day of the show.

For the one-time admission price of \$10, anyone 13 and older can enjoy all three days of the show. Children 12 and under are admitted free with an adult.

Planning is underway for the 60th Owensville Threshers Association show to be held in Rosebud July 15 through the 17.

Memorial Park

Throughout the summer months, Owensville's Memorial Park will have a lot of activity between Winter Water Park, the golf course and campground.

Winter Water Park, named after the late, longtime park supporter Milford H. H. Winter, is located at 705 Parker Drive. The facility was built in 2014 and features a zero-depth entry, baby bungee, splash elements, castle with 3 slides, 14' tall body flume, lazy river, rock climbing wall, diving board, shade structures and a covered concession pavilion.

During the summer, the facility is open daily from 12-6 pm from Memorial Day Weekend through Labor Day Weekend, with reduced hours after Gasconade County R-2 School District resumes classes for the school year.

Owensville Golf Course, located at 702 North Maple Street, is a 9-hole public course that was built in 1952




on approximately 40 acres within Memorial Park. Course features 2,076 yards of golf from the longest tees for a par of 32. Greens consist of creeping bentgrass, while the rest of the course is a mixture of bermuda, zoysia and kentucky fescue. Green fees, cart rentals and memberships are offered. Cash and checks are accepted year-round, with credit cards accepted seasonally (approximately April through September). Leagues and tournament rentals are available.

Memorial Park Campground, located at 510 Red Oak Road, has 25 sites; most are equipped with both water and electric (30 amp) shared between sites. Water at sites will be locked and unavailable November - March. There is a seasonal single-occupant bathhouse approximately 350 feet from campground that is open April-October. There is a dump station onsite available for an additional fee.

Douglas Prairie Quilt Trail

Tourism Committee works on "Trail" with quilt block theme.

ne of the best parts about visiting a new area is learning about the local history, what makes the community come together and why it is proud of its origins. The Owensville Chamber of Commerce (COC) Tourism Committee is working on ways to share the pride of the Owensville, Drake and Rosebud communities as "Find Your Own Trail" destinations to encourage tourists to visit area attractions. The group hopes to establish the idea with one of the town's existing allures, a Quilt Block Trail.

Quilt blocks are designed to tell stories, including history, politics and religion. Originally, the chamber hoped to encourage interest and curiosity about Owensville's origins locally. The idea became reality in 2012, when the chamber chose the quilt block "Crossroads" (pictured center) to represent their location on Old Springfield Road because it's building is located at the crossroads of the Old Iron Road and Springfield Road that took travelers between Hermann and Springfield.

Historically, people used to stop and water their mules at the location because it was the halfway point from St. James to Hermann.

When the quilt blocks first began to appear on the exterior walls of downtown businesses, residents and visitors took notice.

"We started out using traditional blocks, but then the Garden Club wanted a large picture of an applique rose they found in a quilt book, "said Gerri Kellmann, head of the quilt block committee.

The blocks grew in popularity "They go as far as the six miles south on Highway EE, as far north as Drake, as far west of Owensville as Lane Building Products and as far east as Rosebud," Kellmann said.

Now that the Rock Island Trail is going through, more people want to be included. The tourism committee has also added other trails to their web site including an antique trail, a wine cheese, food and farm trail and a trail to family fun.

"Small towns have to live together as a region, because we are not going to make it alone," Grus said. "We have to find a way to make our whole area stronger."

"We are gathering info and having some kind of map created, both printed and online, so someone could go to our website and see what there is to do this weekend, then go," Grus said.

The committee will continue to

promote "Find Your Own Trail." Contact the chamber with questions or suggestions through their website at www. OwensvilleMissouri.com, and click on the "contact us" tab.

Gasconade County Historical Society Museum

The Gasconade County Historical Museum (GCHS) was constructed about 1910 to serve railroad clientele and has been known as the Owensville Hotel, Ozark Hotel, and the Railroad Hotel.

The museum's focus is primarily on items related to Gasconade County and its residents. The display rooms tell the stories of people coming to this area to start a new life. They depict their homes and farms, clothing and tools, churches and schools. It tells of a people who were involved in six wars, founded businesses, civic and social organizations and left us with a wonderful heritage of music, art and literature.



Rock Island Trail exploration in the works

Sitors and residents alike are ready to take advantage of the Rock Island Trail — a former railroad turned hiking and biking corridor that is now owned by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources under the management of State Parks.

souri Bock Island Trail

Missouri Gov. Mike Parson announced on Dec. 14, 2021, after nearly 30 years of attempts to convert the former railroad, that the state would accept the 144 miles of the corridor. The new linear park that stretches from Beaufort to Windsor was formerly owned by Ameren Missouri and began its physical transformation into a hiking and biking trail in 2016. A salvage company was hired to take up the metal rails and clean up the wood ties.

Local officials are already attractions for the trail and are teaming up with neighboring communities to advertise available shopping, camping, antiquing and sightseeing to potential visitors.

The Owensville community is centrally located among four other trail communities, all within 10 miles or less of their neighbor for a total 40-mile span. Belle, Bland, Owensville, Rosebud, and Gerald are looking to connect their communities along the trail and encourage visitors to make a weekend trip on the stretch.

Local representatives from three of the four communities met with State Parks officials in January 2022 to request assistance with completing nearly 40 miles of trail that stretches between Gerald and Belle. At least one community, Belle, has applied for grants to help complete their section of the trail through the city limits according to the state's specifications. Officials have discussed providing camping at Belle City Park in addition to advertising the many restaurants that the city has.

The Belle Community Betterment Association (BCBA) is also raising money to build a Flag Park near that trail. The park will have every state flag in the United States for visitors to see. One of the primary supporters of the Flag Park is BCBA member Kathy Stanfield who recently passed. A donation to the Flag Park was recently made in Stanfield's honor by her son's employer.

When visitors arrive in Belle town, they will be greeted by the two-story MFA building that local business owner Jimmy Zumwalt is remodeling into offices. Opportunities to explore downtown Belle happen another two blocks down at Alverado Avenue. Those who stay on the trail will eventually reach Belle City Park, a perfect picnic, fishing and rest stop area.

The city of Bland is located five miles from Belle and will be a "stay over" location where people can comfortably spend the night between their exploration of Owensville. They can then travel on to Belle and eventually Freeburg to see the Gascondy Train Bridge. Bland is 35 miles from the famous bridge. The five See **Trail** page 31

miles hike between Belle and Bland is perfect for the mature biker.

Trail visitors should check the City of Bland Mo. Facebook page for community events for more information.

The city of Owensville offers several bed and breakfasts located in downtown historical buildings for visitors who chose to explore the Rock Island. If visitors are coming from Rosebud, they will eventually get to walk across the Soap Creek trestle near the Estes farmstead. The trail runs past a future "safe way to school" as it gets closer to the city limits, runs through various industries and neighborhoods before leading out to Sears Avenue behind City Hall, and just a block away from First Street businesses.

On the way to First Street, visit the Historical Society located in the Old Owensville Hotel.

Businesses on First Street include small clothing boutiques, pubs and grills, and a coffee shop. Several buildings are also in various stages of remodeling in preparation for commercial and bed and breakfast space.

Travel six miles west on Highway 50 to visit Rosebud, where most of the businesses are sandwiched between the Rock Island Trail and Highway 50. Rosebud is home to antique shops, boutiques and pubs. Residents know the trail will be good for their future as Rosebud works to continue bringing in more business.

A campground was recently built in Rosebud to allow visitors to camp, shop, explore and take a ride back down the trail at their leisure.

The city of Gerald offers unique opportunities to visitors in several forms, especially because of the Rock Island Depot located along Highway 28. Visit the only Rock Island Depot to survive in all five towns. The little park is perfect for a picnic lunch, and the various restaurants can pack lunches to go. Both the Bistro at the Mill, a former mill turned restaurant, Figos (Mexican style), and the newest restaurant Simply Sweet 2 are located near the Rock Island Trail.

Each town is planning to have its own brochures made, trailheads up and information stands available shortly. The Rock Island Trail is here and it's time to start building! For those who enjoy a camping trip, hiking, biking or just traveling through, stop in and visit for a while. These Rock Island Trail Communities can't wait.

1957 Chevy Bel Air: A "legend among the classics"

ot many old cars are more recognizable than the "legend among the classics" that is the 1957 Chevy Bel Air, and Ken (Fuzz) Dorton's newly restored vintage ride is a great example of the model's timelessness.

"I always wanted a 1957 hardtop," said Fuzz, who is most recognizable by his 1956 Nomad that he hotrodded through the '70s around Owensville.

Fuzz's relationship with the '57 Bel Air began in 2006 at a GTA Car Club Christmas party at Allen Lowder's Auto Body shop.

"The car was sitting there looking kinda sad in the bay," Fuzz said. "Mike Reifer comes up to me and says 'you need to buy that from me.""

Once the idea was planted, Fuzz couldn't shake it.

"I don't know, I just let my zeal override my common sense," he said. "Took me about a week-anda-half and I was like "alright, Reif, I'll buy this from you.'I even had to borrow the money. It took me five years to pay it off. I started working on it in 2010 and finished it in 2021."

Like every classic-car enthusiast who knows he will have to sit on that project a while before he can



get it started, Fuzz dug into the history of the '57 while he eagerly anticipated its restoration.

"Gary Smart owned it since 1963," Fuzz said, talking about the Smart family from Gerald. "He was coming home from work one day in April 1982 and his wife was driving the car from Owensville to Gerald and rear-ended a guy in a pickup truck. Rumor was she was picking up a cake for (Gary's) birthday."

The car was eventually sold to

Allen Lowder, then Reifer and finally to Fuzz.

"I put it in the barn for about five years because I had no money to do anything with it," Fuzz said. "When I got it, it was wrecked. A new windshield had been put in cause the hood went through it. The cowl was bent up."

From 2006 to 2010, the '57 remained in Fuzz's barn, waiting for restoration. She came out looking much the same with several

more layers dust than she went in with.

"The floor pan was rusted out,

the inner and outer rockers were rusted, the front end was wrecked," Fuzz said, remembering the rough condition she was in. "It had the windshield though."

Coming out of the barn, the apple red interior was still good as well as the door panels.

"I cut the floor pan out and put it up on the rotisserie and then sandblasted," Fuzz said. "I sandblasted the car all the way around six inches up the frame

inside and out the wheel wells and firewall. The rest of the body you work by hand. I don't believe in sandblasting the body 'cause it roughs 'em up. But all that metal I was going to replace I wanted to sandblast to see what I could attach to it."

He said the trunk looked good at first, but after sandblasting, it wasn't good after all.

He took the whole thing apart to the last screw.

"These old cars look good on the outside, but things underneath aren't so well," Fuzz said from experience. "For five years the

dome light was the only thing left hanging in it's ceiling and l eventually yanked that out."

The self-described machinist, mechanic, and autobody man realized that if he was to make this restoration happen on his own, he was going to need a few pieces unique pieces to work with.

"It took me three months to make an automobile rotisserie," he said. "It's the Cadillac of rotisseries and one of these days I'm gonna sell it."

Made out of the axel of an old

mobile home, Fuzz welded and cut until the rotisserie took shape and added levels, pulls, tires and brakes to make it adjustable. Holes were drilled to match up to the car so when it was skewered on the rotisserie it could be bolted down and rotated.

The headliner in the car was moldy.

Sandblasting came first, then replacing those rusted parts with new ones.





THE INTERIOR of the Bel Air is Candy Apple Red. Dorton outfitted the '57 with modern conveniences — Tilt steering wheel, cruise control, air conditioning, power windows and locks and a modern stereo so he can listen to classic music as he cruises in his classic Chevrolet.



"Bondo is a real problem in old cars like this one," Fuzz said.

Cutting out the bad and replacing the underneath was a must.

He rebuilt all the suspension on the front and rear, put a new floor pan back in, sway bars, front and rear power disk brakes, drop spindles, power steering, power windows and locks, tilt steering column and Dakota Digital Gauges.

"They aren't really digital (gauges) but they have the needle on them and they look original and pretty," Fuzz said. "I also added a custom sound stereo system and download music to a jump drive to listen to it in the car. Plus rain gear wipers with a modern-day threespeed setting."

He ended up replacing all of the windows, side trim, headlight bezels, bumpers, grille, emblems, and door handles.

"All the pretty stuff, all of the jewelry, a new headliner and new

carpet (was replaced)," Fuzz said.

While he did most of the work himself, Fuzz called friends who were car enthusiasts like himself to assist with certain parts of the project.

He didn't stop with cosmetics though. Adding in AC and heat required additional wiring.

"The original car had like five wires and the new cars have 500," Fuzz joked. "I replaced them with a 25-pound wiring harness from American Auto."

The '57 was starting to retake her shape. He reinforced the frame with over 200 feet of

angle iron.

"I did all the body work, primer work myself and got it pretty then talked to Bobby Scheel," Fuzz said. "If you have painted yourself you know it's a mess in your shop."

When Fuzz called Scheel, his buddy wasn't committing to painting anything.

"He's particular," Fuzz said. "Bobby said he would paint it if it was gonna look good. He came out and ran his hands over it and

said he would paint it 'cause'it's gonna be pretty.'

The car went out of Fuzz's shop and into Scheel's in pieces. Scheel painted it black and added a clear coat to make the car shine.

While he waited for pieces to be complete, Fuzz was building a motor for the car.

"I built the rung stand and fired the engine up on the rung stand," Fuzz said. "I built a 383 cubic inch small block. I build my own engines when I am doing stuff like this."

He also added mufflers.

"It sounds pretty good," Fuzz said. "I am a machinist and a fabricator. I planned this stuff out before I do it."

He also built a 4L60 overdrive transmission for the vintage '57 Bel Air that was taken off of a 1979 Camaro rear-end assembly and added 342 gears in it for a positraction rear-end that will provide the vehicle with more traction control on the open road.

"I made a pitman arm attached to a steering box — 600 Delphi that did not come original on a '57," Fuzz said.

The project was made of the upper half of an '87 pickup and the bottom half of a '57. I cut them in half, grinded and welded them together."

"An old-timer once said anybody can restore a car," Fuzz said. "It takes a real one cut one uptrying to modernize it. That thing fails, I'm in trouble."

The '57 Bel Air came out with a factory 283 engine that could jump from zero to 60 miles per hour in 9.9 seconds, not fast by modern standards but impressive for its time. Fuzz wasn't looking to change too much on the speed.

"I built it to drive," Fuzz said. "I built it to cruise, not to smoke the tires."

While Fuzz will say he did the bulk of the work on the '57 himeslef, his friends and lady were there any time he called for a hand.

"Mike Reifer and Mike Scego help me put the windshield and back glass in the car," Fuzz said. "My sweetheart Marilyn Russell also helped me when I called her out of the house to assist and my brother Buck Dorton and his son Shane Dorton helped."

Fuzz said that in projects like car restoration, relying on someone else to help get you moving, isn't going to work.

"You can't expect a lot of help from people," Fuzz said. "You take on a project like this and have to understand you are going to be doing it on your own."

After 10 years of working on the '57 Chevy for three to five nights a week, his efforts paid off.


"I finished the car back in August 2021 and this year I plan to take it to the TriFive event in Kentucky," Fuzz said. "I cruised it up to Rustober Fest in New Florence during the summer of 2021 and that was quite a deal, big car party."

He was driving home from New Florence on Highway 19 South of Hermann and turned left off of the bridge onto mainstreet to grab food on their way home.

"Didn't know it was October Fest in Hermann and as we went to one of the restaurants to get something to eat, the street was jammed packed with people hootin' and hollerin' and runnin' up to take pictures," Fuzz said. "You'd think we was celebrities."

It doesn't get much better than making memories in an vintage ride that is rebuilt into a turnkey daily vehicle with a great stereo system.

"I am a child of the '60s and '70s," Fuzz says. "I like the classics and I like to listen to the classics."
